**Sermon preached by The Rev. Charles Rowins at St. Christopher-by-the-Sea, Gibson Island, Maryland, May 9, 2021, Sixth Sunday of Easter, Mother's Day.**

It's Mother's Day. A day to recognize what moms do so well. Namely, lift us up. Make us feel better. Not only when we're sick and need some tender loving care, but when we're down on ourselves for whatever reason. A hug, a kiss, a word of encouragement. Thank you, Mom, for always being there when I need you. You seem to know when encouragement is in order. And, even when you're not feeling well, you make me feel better.

Today's Psalm (**Psalm 98**) could have been written by a mother:

"Sing to the Lord a new song.  
Shout with joy to the Lord, all you lands.  
Sing to the Lord with the harp and voice of song.  
Let the sea make a noise.  
Let the rivers clap their hands."

Likewise, today's Epistle (**I John 5:1-6**).

"And this is the victory that conquers the world, our faith."  
Not my faith, not your faith, but our faith. We're in this together.

And the words from John's Gospel (**John 15:9-17**) couldn't be more mother-like:

"As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love. I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete."

Now, it is true that not every mother-son, mother-daughter relationship is of this nature. But somewhere in that mother-child bond, even if not evident to the child, is a parent's love and hope for the well-being of the child.

And, of course, this is true for fathers as well. But we have our own day, don't we, so let's stay for the mother theme. It's their day today. And, if truth be told, a father's love is at some level different from a mom's love. There's something about carrying and bearing a child that sets moms apart.

Allright, Father Rowins. Enough schmalz. Get on with it. It's the Sixth Sunday of Easter. Do your job.

Okay, here we go. Let's focus today on the last verse of today's Gospel. "I am giving you these commands so that you may love one another."

Why am I raising you the way I am raising you? So that you may love one another? Why not so that you will be famous or wealthy or successful in the field of your dreams or recognized for greatness? Why not wish for an outcome that has more teeth to it than "so that you may love one another"?

If we were asked to set a target for our children or grandchildren, would that target be something as nebulous as "love one another," or more specific as in "a good education, a successful career, a happy marriage, a long and healthy life"?

As far as we know, Jesus didn't say much, if anything, about education or career. He spoke of "loving one another." There's no advanced degree specified. There's no job specified. There's no public recognition specified. There's no income projection.

Indeed, "loving one another" probably isn't a deal-maker or deal-breaker for children. For example, how much if any "so that you may love one another" conversation takes place in college counseling, either on the part of the counselor or the student?

As you know, one of the most critical ingredients in the college application process is the recommendation that the college counselor or other senior staff member provides. I would hope that a positive assessment of the applicant's concern for others is one of the areas addressed. However, whether it is received with the same strength as other personal characteristics is another matter.

For example, does "caring for others" have the same weight as an off-the-chart standardized test score? Maybe in some cases, but probably not in most.

The point is simply that over the long haul, over a career, over a life-time, the ability to love one another is important, perhaps more important than any other

factor in maturation. It deserves attention. In today's lesson from Acts (**Acts 10:44-48**), Peter asks "Can anyone withhold the water for baptizing these people ...." In other words, the desire to love one another needs nurturing. By nature, moms take this role seriously.

When we find our children or grandchildren down in the dumps because they perceive that their lives are not moving as they had hoped, we're not tempted to say "Get a job," but rather "Look for someone to help." Love one another is a tried and true recipe for helping oneself as well as others.

Do I sound like a mom? Well, I must confess, I sound like my mom. I have no idea how many times I disappointed my folks, but I know how many times they disappointed me. And that would be zero. They always found a bright side even when outcomes were other than I had hoped and maybe they had hoped.

"As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love. I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete."

As Jesus reminded the disciples that they were loved by God (**John 15:9-17**), so we as parents have an opportunity and a responsibility to remind our children that they are loved, not only by their parents, but by the Creator of the Universe. How neat is that! And as recipients of that divine love, all of us have an obligation, and the joy, to share that conviction with others.

Whatever career, whatever path, whatever opportunity afforded, will be enhanced many fold if we love one another. This is not theoretical. This is actual. As adults, we know this to be so. As parents and as teachers and as friends, conveying this conviction to young people is itself an act of love. Remember the words of Jesus in today's Gospel (**John 15:9-17**): "I have said these things to you so that ..... your joy may be complete."

So, moms, thank you for everything, but especially for reminding us that the love you have shared with us is intended not just for us, but for others. We are to love others as we have been loved. And, if, for whatever reason, we question our mom's love for us, that reality doesn't nullify our responsibility to love others in a manner that our Lord would be proud of.

It's never too late to say to our mom, "Thanks for the love, and thanks for the reminder, sometimes stern, to share that love with others."

Today's Collect contains this phrase: "Pour into our hearts such love towards you, that we, loving you in all things and above all things, may obtain your promises." Oh yes, we are offering this prayer to God, but, with all due respect to God, we can apply this language to our parents. They have hopes for us. They sacrifice for us. They stick by us. In response, we can return "the hug, the kiss, and the word of encouragement."

Happy Mothers Day. *Amen.*

## Lessons for 6<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Easter – May 9, 2021

**Collect:** O God, you have prepared for those who love you such good things as surpass our understanding: Pour into our hearts such love towards you, that we, loving you in all things and above all things, may obtain your promises, which exceed all that we can desire; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen.*

### **First Reading: Acts 10:44-48**

While Peter was still speaking the Holy Spirit fell upon all who heard the word. The circumcised believers who had come with Peter were astounded that the gift of the Holy Spirit had been poured out even on the Gentiles, for they heard them speaking in tongues and extolling God. Then Peter said, “Can anyone withhold the water for baptizing these people who have received the Holy Spirit just as we have?” So he ordered them to be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ. Then they invited him to stay for several days.

Sing to the Lord a new song,  
*for he has done marvelous things.*  
With his right hand and his holy arm  
has he won for himself the victory.  
The Lord has made known his victory;

### **Second Reading: I John 5:1-6**

Everyone who believes that Jesus is the Christ has been born of God, and everyone who loves the parent loves the child. By this we know that we love the children of God, when we love God and obey his commandments. For the love of God is this, that we obey his commandments. And his commandments are not burdensome, for whatever is born of God conquers the world. And this is the victory that conquers the world, our faith. Who is it that conquers the world but the one who believes that Jesus is the Son of God?

This is the one who came by water and blood, Jesus Christ, not with the water only but with the water and the blood. And the Spirit is the one that testifies, for the Spirit is the truth.

### **Gospel: John 15:9-17**

Jesus said to his disciples, "As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love. If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete.

"This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. You are my friends if you do what I command you. I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father. You did not choose me but I chose you. And I appointed you to go and bear fruit, fruit that will last, so that the Father will give you whatever you ask him in my name. I am giving you these commands so that you may love one another."
