**Sermon preached by the Rev. Charles Rowins on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of Advent  
at St. Christopher-by-the-Sea, Gibson Island, Maryland, December 11, 2022.**

Today's sermon title is "The Greatest Halftime Talk Ever!"

When we think of a Halftime Talk, most of us think of football. The first half is over. The second half is not far away. And we're tired. But we're also hopeful. Some things went right in the first half, but some things went wrong, or at least not as hoped.

Every sport has a version of a halftime talk. Tired, but hopeful. Religious faith also has a version of a halftime talk. And we're in it right now. Tired, but hopeful.

Let's look first at "tired." Why are we exhausted? Well, we missed some blocks. We missed some tackles. We called the wrong plays. We didn't recognize the strength of the opposition.

There were moments when we did okay, but not what we needed to do to claim victory. Nor what we wanted to do. And not what we trained for. And not what we hoped for.

But the first half is what it is. And, it's not the second half, so maybe there's still hope. Yes, we have a second half to get things right, or, if not "right," then better.

That would be the appropriate half-time talk. Honest, but determined to do better.

Well, you and I have just listened to one of the great half-time talks. This one came in four pieces. One piece from Isaiah, one from Psalm 146, one from the Letter of James, and one from the Gospel of Matthew.

**From Isaiah: "The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad, the desert shall rejoice and blossom." From Psalm 146: "The Lord shall reign for ever, your God, O Zion, through all generations. Hallelujah!" And from the Letter of James – the brother of Jesus: "You also must be patient. Strengthen your hearts, for the coming of the Lord is near." And from the Gospel of Matthew: "See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way before you."**

In short, better days are coming. Indeed victory is coming. Stay with program. Keep the faith! The second half is ours, thanks to the Lord.

This Season of Advent is a Season of Honesty. We're in some trouble, and we can't seem to get out of this trouble on our own. We need some intervention. And who better to intervene than God.

It makes sense, doesn't it? God has skin in this game. God is determined to turn the tide. He is going to call the greatest audible of all time. He Himself will enter the contest and do what he needs to do to be victorious. Even if this strategy costs him his own life.

Crazy? No, not crazy. God is God after all. God can do whatever God wants. God can turn all sorts of tides in more positive directions. Christmas is coming. It is in sight. Oh yes, there is work to do. It is Advent after all. But it is God who is promising. It is the Creator of the Universe who can swing the tide.

From Isaiah: "Be strong, do not fear!" With an exclamation mark! "Here is your God. He will come with vengeance, with terrible recompense. He will come and save you."

But – and this is key and this is what good coaches do at halftime – you, Team, have to step up. I'm behind you, but I'm not going to do all the work.

You know what you're supposed to do. So do it! I'll be with you. I'll pick you up when you're down. I'll give you clues when you need them. I'll have your back in ways you'll never know about. But I'm not going to do everything. You've got to step up. Don't take my love – my very own Son – for granted.

He is a gift. So be thankful. But not cocky. There's still a long way to go in this contest. The Second Half will need your best effort. And it's an effort based on saying, "Thank you, Lord, for all your blessings, especially your Son Jesus, and all the second chances, the second-halves, that we are receiving."

Where are we in this picture? How do we fit? Is there really a chance that things will be better? And, if so, what is our responsibility? Just to wait for better things to happen, or to help make them happen?

Well, we know that answer, don't we? Our job is to help make "better things" happen.

And we do so in thanksgiving and in trust. Thanksgiving for having a role – "put me in Coach, I'm ready" – and for making a positive difference in the outcome – "I'm not sure if I can make a difference, but I'll try. I'll give it my best shot. And I'll do so, confident that, whatever my contribution, it will be acceptable to you, Coach."

This response on our part is offered in trust. We trust that there is a God. We trust that this God cares for us, including giving us an assignment. And we trust that no matter how small our contribution might be, God will use that contribution to further His Kingdom.

The Second Half is going to happen whatever decision we make. If we don't give thanks and if we don't trust, we won't change the outcome. The outcome is in God's hands. God wants us to participate. God expects us to participate. God will be sad if we don't participate. But if God wants a Second Half comeback, God will see that this happens, whatever you and I do.

But, if this is so, that God will achieve victory with or without us, why would we not want to participate? How sad for us. And how sad for those who might be moved by our faith? We are recipients of the Good News, with an expectation that we will share that Good News. Why would we want to disappoint the Author of that Good News? Jesus is going to die on a cross for us. Are we going to walk away from that death and call it quits? Or, are we going to fall on our knees in thanksgiving and then stand up and report for duty?

We wrestle with our response all the time. Most of the time, we're on board. Some of the time, though, we have second thoughts. And it's during those second thought times that we are vulnerable. We tired, and we need a break, a halftime. And, during that halftime, we need some encouragement. And, lo and behold, we have visitors to the locker room. Isaiah and James and Matthew. And individually and collectively they remind us of our part in the victory. Not to sit idly by, but to engage.

From the Letter of James: "Strengthen your hearts, for the coming of the Lord is near." In the second half, we trust. Amen.

**Lessons for 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of Advent**  
**December 11, 2022**

**Collect:** Stir up your power, O Lord, and with great might come among us; and, because we are sorely hindered by our sins, let your bountiful grace and mercy speedily help and deliver us; through Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom, with you and the Holy Spirit, be honor and glory, now and for ever. *Amen.*

**First Reading: Isaiah 35:1-10**

The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad, the desert shall rejoice and blossom; like the crocus it shall blossom abundantly, and rejoice with joy and singing. The glory of Lebanon shall be given to it, the majesty of Carmel and Sharon. They shall see the glory of the Lord, the majesty of our God. Strengthen the weak hands, and make firm the feeble knees. Say to those who are of a fearful heart, “Be strong, do not fear! Here is your God. He will come with vengeance, with terrible recompense. He will come and save you.” Then the eyes of the lame shall leap like a deer, and the tongue of speechless sing for joy. For waters shall break forth in the wilderness, and streams in the desert; the burning sand shall become a pool, and the thirsty ground springs of water; the haunt of jackals shall become a swamp, the grass shall become reeds and rushes. A highway shall be there, and it shall be called the Holy Way; the unclean shall not travel on it, but it shall be God’s people; no traveler, not even fools, shall go astray. No lion shall be there, nor shall any ravenous beasts come upon on it; they shall not be found there, but the redeemed shall walk there. And the ransomed of the Lord will return, and come to Zion with singing; everlasting joy shall be upon their heads; they shall obtain joy and gladness, and sorrow and sighing shall flee away.

**Gospel: Matthew 11:2-11**

When John heard in prison what the Messiah was doing, he sent word by his disciples and said to him, “Are you the one who is to come, or are we to wait for another?” Jesus answered them, “Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind receive their sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have good news brought to them. And blessed is anyone who take no offense at me.” As they went away, Jesus began to speak to the crowds about John: “What did you go out into the wilderness to look at? A reed shaken by the wind? What then did you go out to see? Someone dressed in soft robes? Look, those who wear soft robes are in royal palaces. What then did you go out to see? A prophet? Yes, I tell you, and more than a prophet. This is the one about whom it is written, ‘See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way before you.’ Truly I tell you, among those born of women no one has arisen great than John the Baptist; yet the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he.”
